### Christian Symbolism

In the monthly newsletters last year, we talked about the use and meanings of the liturgical colors in the sanctuary. We see them every week, and it was good to stop briefly and remember their meanings. This year we will talk about the Christian symbols. Every Sunday we see various Christian symbols reflected in the sanctuary, on the paraments, the communion rail cushions, the banners, and elsewhere. We likely give little thought to them because we see them as part of the surroundings so often. However, they have varied and significant meanings, and if we know their significance, we can appreciate them more.

The most enduring symbol of Lutheranism is the seal that Luther himself designed to represent his theology, which we call Luther's Rose. By the early 1520s, this seal began to appear on the title page of Luther's works. Our church building has a stained-glass Luther's Rose window, visible from the outside, above the front door. This symbol also appears at the top of the newsletter each month.



Here is how Luther himself explained its meaning:

*“First, there is a black cross in a heart that remains its natural color. This is to remind me that it is faith in the Crucified One that saves us. Anyone who believes from the heart will be justified (Romans 10:10). It is a black cross, which mortifies and causes pain, but it leaves the heart its natural color. It doesn’t destroy nature, that is to say, it does not kill us but keeps us alive, for the just shall live by faith in the Crucified One (Romans 1:17). The heart should stand in the middle of a white rose. This is to show that faith gives joy, comfort, and peace—it puts the believer into a white, joyous rose. Faith does not give peace and joy like the world gives (John 14:27). This is why the rose must be white, not red. White is the color of the spirits and angels (Matthew 28:3; John 20:12). This rose should stand in a sky-blue field, symbolizing that a joyful spirit and faith is a beginning of heavenly, future joy, which begins now, but is grasped in hope, not yet fully revealed. Around the field of blue is a golden ring to symbolize that blessedness in heaven lasts forever and has no end. Heavenly blessedness is exquisite, beyond all joy and better than any possessions, just as gold is the most valuable and precious metal.”*

# Outreach Team

## Winter Relief

A consortium of Crofton churches sponsor Winter Relief annually for 25 homeless AA County residents. The clients are physically hosted overnight at Seton Parish; other churches support the effort by supplying 3 meals a day for 7 days among other items.

This is how St. Paul's participates in Winter Relief:

The Quilters provide individual quilts and frequently bed pillows. The Outreach Team collects new men's regular and thermal underwear along with travel toiletries. Additionally, Outreach organizes meal support for one morning's breakfasts for 25 men, 1 day's lunches for 25 (done this year by Sunday School and Youth Group), and one evening's supper for 40 people (clients and support staff). Judy Tribby leads the Breakfast Team, Penny Courtney leads the Supper Team.

Winter Relief takes place this year from the evening of February 6th until the morning of February 13th. If you would be interested in helping out in this year's Winter Relief, please contact Bernice Prescott or Penny Courtney.

## **2023 MaryAnne and Jake Folk Scholarship**

MaryAnne and Jake Folk were members of St. Paul's for over 30 years, during which time they both made huge contributions to St. Paul's in many different ways. When Jake passed away in February, 2007, MaryAnne decided to use the money in his memorial fund to set up a scholarship in his memory. The first scholarships were awarded in the spring of 2008. In December of 2008 MaryAnne passed away suddenly after a brief illness. The Folk children, Teri Folk, Jeff Folk, Toni Hetzer, and Kimberley Levine, decided to honor both their parents by combining memorial funds into the MaryAnne and Jake Folk Memorial Scholarship. It is now time to think about the 2023 Folk Memorial Scholarship.

The intention of this scholarship is to promote and provide opportunities for higher education to the active youth of St. Paul's Lutheran Church. The scholarship, which is an award up to \$500, is open to all active high school seniors at St. Paul's who are graduating in 2023 and are committed to attend any institution of higher learning.

Applicants will be required to complete a short application and write a one-page essay on a topic chosen by the Folk family. The Folk family is responsible for selection of the winner, based solely on the essays, which are given to the Folk family anonymously.
