I come away feeling affirmed by you and I learned some new things about how people perceive me. Most of the comments were directed at our ministry together, for which I am thankful to God, and you for your support, without which a good bit of what happened would not have happened.

Here's some of what folks will miss or valued.

Visiting the seniors and shut-ins was at the top of the list. Apparently that had not been very consistent. What a "golden group" and a joy they are to be with.

The Quilters too, a delightful, dedicated group of servants they are and "they let me in." I will miss those Tuesday mornings "slumming" it with them.

Leading by offering ideas and letting them be without forcing decisions to go my way. Sermons and their conversational style, usually understood with life applications. Steady hand on the tiller.

Characteristics: passionate, honest, approachable and understanding. We did some new things and people seemed to like them.

In the middle both good and a pain. One person said I was like the tug boat that pulled up alongside the oil tanker on the way into port and kept bumping it till it got into place. I like it.

Someone said I was too persistent about pushing you to invite your friends which apparently you had been doing for years to no effect since they were all churched people. That makes sense. Honesty was liked, but equally disliked as I heard it. Apparently my handwriting is hard to read for those who faced that task.

I got carried away with the sermon at times, yes, often.

One person said they were thankful for the coronavirus since they did not have to carry all the items out of the church for the "stripping of the altar" on Maundy Thursday.

When it comes to a new pastor here's what folks are looking forward to:

After 2 1/2 years of change/transition people are looking forward to having the stability of a full time pastor, a team member, living in community for an extended period of time. They would like to work together to minister to young families with elementary and high school children and work on reaching out to young adults. They would like to see ministry to the Quilters and shut-ins and seniors continue. They are looking for a pastor with a new spirit, passion, outreach interest and energy for Christ, church and community.

They are concerned about the getting to know process in this environment (pandemic). They want to see collaboration in ministry from all members and are hopeful that people will work with the changes that will inevitably come. They are hopeful that the good work of the "call committee" and the promise of a new beginning with a new pastor will give birth to growth in faith, community and service.

I'm reminded of Paul's words in Romans 8:28 "And in all things we know that God works for the good of those who love Him, who have been called according to His purpose." Notice it says, "God works for the good of those who love Him." That is His promise and purpose, He will be working for the good that He wants to come out of this ministry moving forward and I firmly believe He wants all of you to join Him in fulfilling that promise to overflowing.

Church Reopening

Together again! That is what the sign says, and what we hope for. By the time you receive this newsletter, our first in-person service since March should have taken place on July 5th as we say farewell to Pastor Dave Betzner. Our second in-person service is planned for July 12th for Pastor Teklu Ketema's installation and ordination. Our intent is to continue to hold weekly worship services in person, unless state or local guidance changes.

Hopefully most of you have participated in our Zoom meeting on reopening, or have read the minutes of that meeting. I want to highlight the key points here, so you know what to expect.

The reopen Church committee used the guidelines published by the State of Maryland and the CDC to guide our decisions on what safety measures to take and how to hold in-person church services with the least amount of risk possible. However, we cannot guarantee a totally risk-free environment. It is up to each individual and family to decide whether or not to attend church. If you aren't ready to return to the building, THAT'S OKAY! We are trying hard to improve the quality of our on-line services to enhance your at-home worship experience. We realize that many of our members are at higher risk, and aren't going to feel comfortable returning to the church building for some time yet. We will continue to keep you in our prayers, welcome you to join us virtually, and hope that you may feel comfortable joining us for one of our outdoor, socially distanced social events.

First and foremost, if you are experiencing any symptoms of illness, or know or believe you have been exposed to the Coronavirus (or any other illness), PLEASE STAY HOME. We will keep you in our prayers.

If you choose to attend, below are some of the highlights of things you will experience:

- Face masks which cover the nose and mouth are mandatory! We will have a supply if you don't have one or forget yours.
- The church will have been sanitized between the last non-St. Paul's activity of the week and the beginning of our Sunday service.
- Doors will be open when you arrive.
- Please arrive early! Several new procedures will make entering the church and being seated take a little longer.
- Hand sanitizing stations will be located throughout the church and in the pews.
- Please use the restroom before you leave home, and consider the restrooms at church to be "emergency use only."
- All frequently touched items such as hymnals, Bibles and even pew cushions have been removed to make cleaning easier.
- You will be asked to wear a name tag.
- All attendees will sign an attendance sheet with contact information to be provided to public health officials in the event contact tracing becomes necessary.

- Half the pews will be blocked to provide the necessary social distancing. You will sit in a pew with just your family members, or on opposite ends of a pew six feet away from one or two other people.
- The service will be projected on the screens.
- We will not be singing! Hymns will either be presented by video or played instrumentally with the words projected for meditation.
- Communion will take place in the pew with individual communion packets
- We will exit the church immediately after the service, and any socializing will take place outside in the parking lot.

Be prepared for changes as the summer progresses, as we learn more about how to worship together safely. We hope to see you at worship sometime this summer, or virtually any day. If you have questions, please ask one of the members of the Reopen Committee. Committee members are mostly the chairs of the standing committees: Diane Segelhorst (Chair), Jane Felsentreger, Judy Tribby, Patrice Jenstrom, Jackie Abend, Bonnie Weinhold, Penny Courtney, Zac Huffman, and Pastor Dave Betzner.


OUTREACH Team News

The first one was held on June 13th and we were overwhelmed with pantry and perishable staples along with clothes detergent and personal hygiene supplies. The foods were distributed the next day to anyone who asked; family size determined how many bags were placed into their cars. That food drive was also the project for a Thrivent Action Team grant that helped us support not only local neighbors in need that came to St. Paul's but also the CCCC Food Pantry

The second food drive was on June 27th and all of the foods collected for that were delivered to the CCCC Food Pantry to help them re-stock their shelves after the COVID lockdown. Over 300 pounds of pantry staples will make a significant difference in the Food Pantry's ability to serve the community.
