Dear St. Paul's faith family,

Grace Mercy and Peace be unto you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! I spent a part of my childhood on my Father's grain farm in the highlands of Ethiopia. Each June, my family planted cereals like wheat, barley, beans, and corn. Through the long winter, we patiently took care of the growing plants by pulling out weeds, protecting it from animals, and trusting the Lord will give rain and sunlight. We watch as the plants sprouted, and then grew strong and tall. The crops grow through the rain, cold, sunshine, and wind. The result was a joyful harvest. However, the harvest was not possible without the growth accomplished during the long hard months of winter. After the long waiting, in October and November, Harvest will be ready.

So, it is with our spiritual life. James 5:7-12 tells us that our Christian life is full of suffering. We might face persecution due to our faith in Jesus Christ. We might be affected by the pandemic. We might be oppressed by the rich and the powerful. We might also get hurt by fellow believers who have superficial faith and life. Today's epistle reading, James 5:7-11 instructs us, Christians how to live in this world that torments us with suffering. First, God calls us to patience (5:7-8). We are instructed to patiently wait for the return of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ (v.7-8). Patience in the basic spheres of everyday life can be a challenge. It can be difficult to wait and to be patient. It can be an even bigger challenge in the light of adversity and suffering. James' audience is facing persecution. They are being wrong and mistreated, and those who are doing it them are prospering. And what does James preach to them? Patience? James preaches patience. He teaches and encourages patience in adversity and suffering by pointing them to Christ's Second Coming. He shows us patience in trials and hardships by pointing us to the same event.

James says to be like the farmer: "Be patient, therefore, brothers, until the coming of the Lord. See how the farmer waits for the precious fruit of the earth, being patient about it, until it receives the early and the late rains. You also be patient." Put yourself in the farmer's shoes for just a moment. It really takes a lot of patience to be a farmer. There are many things out of a farmer's control that he has just to wait out. He has no control over the sunshine or the amount of rain that will fall. He cannot control the temperature. He cannot heavily affect growth. He

cannot prevent an enemy invasion. He cannot prevent theft or vandals or fully stop animals from grazing on his crops. He cannot even guarantee that the seeds of what he had planted will sprout! And when things are planted, he has to wait for months. There is so much out of his control! You have to wait, hope, and pray and see how things turn out! Can you imagine being a farmer without patience?

There are many times in life when we are put in the position of the farmer. There are many things out of our control. There are problems we have to be patient in and sometimes can't do anything about. We have no control over a market crash or housing drop. Friendships for some reason can fizzle. You dry yourself off after the shower and find that lump. We have no control over politics and the policies that are produced. Insurance and other rates can go up. COVID 19 could distract our life. Life can throw those random problems and more.

What we do? In these situations, we wait. We patiently endure. We remain on the Lord, look to Him, and His Coming. James urges and teaches patience in problems. He also encourages us to be patient with others. He also focuses our eyes on Jesus return. Jesus' second coming is a good thing for Christians. It means our salvation and vindication. It means the end of suffering, stress, pain, persecution, heartache, oppression and loss. It means a new heaven, a new earth, a new body, and the reunion with our departed loved ones in the Lord. Jesus' return gives us hope, comfort, and encouragement to face the day. It means that something better is coming ahead! So, "be patient. Establish your hearts; for the coming of the Lord is at hand."

Second, avoid complaining (5:9). It is natural to complain when we are persecuted and oppressed. Patience must be mixed with the harmony that results from controlled speech and behavior (v. 9). Thus, God counsels us against complaining about one another. The apostle James writes the epistle of James to the Jewish believers of the first century that were scattered to Judea, Samaria, and beyond after Stephen's death due to persecution (1:2-4; Acts 8:1). They faced discrimination due to lack of love, 2:1-13, bitterness in speech/ complaining, 3:1-12, and attitude, 3:13-4:3. And oppression by the rich,5:1-6. In verse 9, James warned them that in spite of the abuse they have endured, they should not grumble.

In our Christian lives, we wrestle with the reality that our Lord has not returned yet. In our problems, this delay can give way to impatience in our dealings with others. James says, "Do not grumble against one another, brothers, so that you may not be judged; behold, the Judge is standing at the door." Our Lord is on His way, and we keep that in mind with our interactions with others. But unfortunately, when we are stressed, scared, or uncertain of our future and circumstances, when we are in the middle of a trial, sickness, pandemic, and any hardship, we can mistreat others. Our patience can be severely diminished in these things.

We might grumble against others by blaming our current problem(s) on them! "It's their fault!" we might say. We might snap on that innocent spouse from the high emotions and energy of it. We might freak out on that friend or complain about our children. We can be tempted to make comparisons with the lots and lives of others and envy their current situation. We might see

their Facebook page and wonder, "Why can't my life be like that?" But James says, "Patience." We wait for the Judge is standing at the door.

Third, there are examples of patience for us (5:10-11). Rather than lashing out at each other, James points us to God's prophets and Job as examples of patience in suffering. They are great examples of patience. The old Testament prophets and Job waited patiently for God's promises to be fulfilled. They were scorned and beaten and even killed (1Corin. 24:20-22), but they were patient. When we read about the lives of people like Moses, like Job, like the prophets, it helps put perspective on our time, doesn't it? Did you know Moses spent 40 years tending sheep before receiving his call to be the leader of God's people? 40 years. When Job had to suffer, lose his family, lose his wealth, lose all but the breath which kept him alive, as he patiently waited on the Lord to deliver him.

Indeed, God's prophets are good examples of patiently suffering and waiting for the Lord. They endured, patiently and hopefully waiting for the judgment and the mercy of God. Similarly, Our God cares about us and what we are going through. He cared so much that He gave His One and Only Son to save and forgive us, and to show us God's mercy. He cares so much that He is with us in our sufferings and problems, just like how He was with Job and the prophets. We are blessed because, in Him, we will persevere. Dear brothers and sisters, we have a God Who is truly merciful and compassionate towards us. Therefore, wait for the return of your Lord patiently!

Are you aware that St. Paul's offers three ways for online giving?

Setting up your profile and payment methods is simple, follow these easy steps.

- 1. On our website, click the donate button- The menu button on the right on the top menu or the "donate now" button at the bottom of the Home Page will take you to the Church Planning Center Giving page. Set up your payment methods one time, and set up your recurring donations here.
- 2. Download and give via the church center app for mobile- Set up your profile and link to St. Paul's of Gambrills and Crofton. Enter your payment method(s) one time, then you can donate at any time easily and quickly. You can also set up recurring donations and pay the fee.
- 3. Text to give- text \$ amount to 84321- You still need to set up your payment methods.

Are you aware that St. Paul's is charged fees for online giving? Please cover the fee!

If you want the church to receive your full donation, you may want to pay the fee. Once you input the amount of your donation and payment method, the processing fee will be calculated and you can click on the box to add it. This would save our church money in fees, and the amount covered by the donor is usually small relative to the size of their donation. Example: If the donor wants to contribute \$100.00 through their checking account, you can cover the (ACH) fee of 25 cents. The year-end tax statement will show that you gave \$100.25 to the church. The church pays the 25 cents for the processing fee, receiving \$100.00. Credit card fees are slightly higher as it is based on a percentage of the amount donated plus a 30 cent fee.
